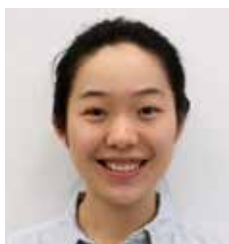

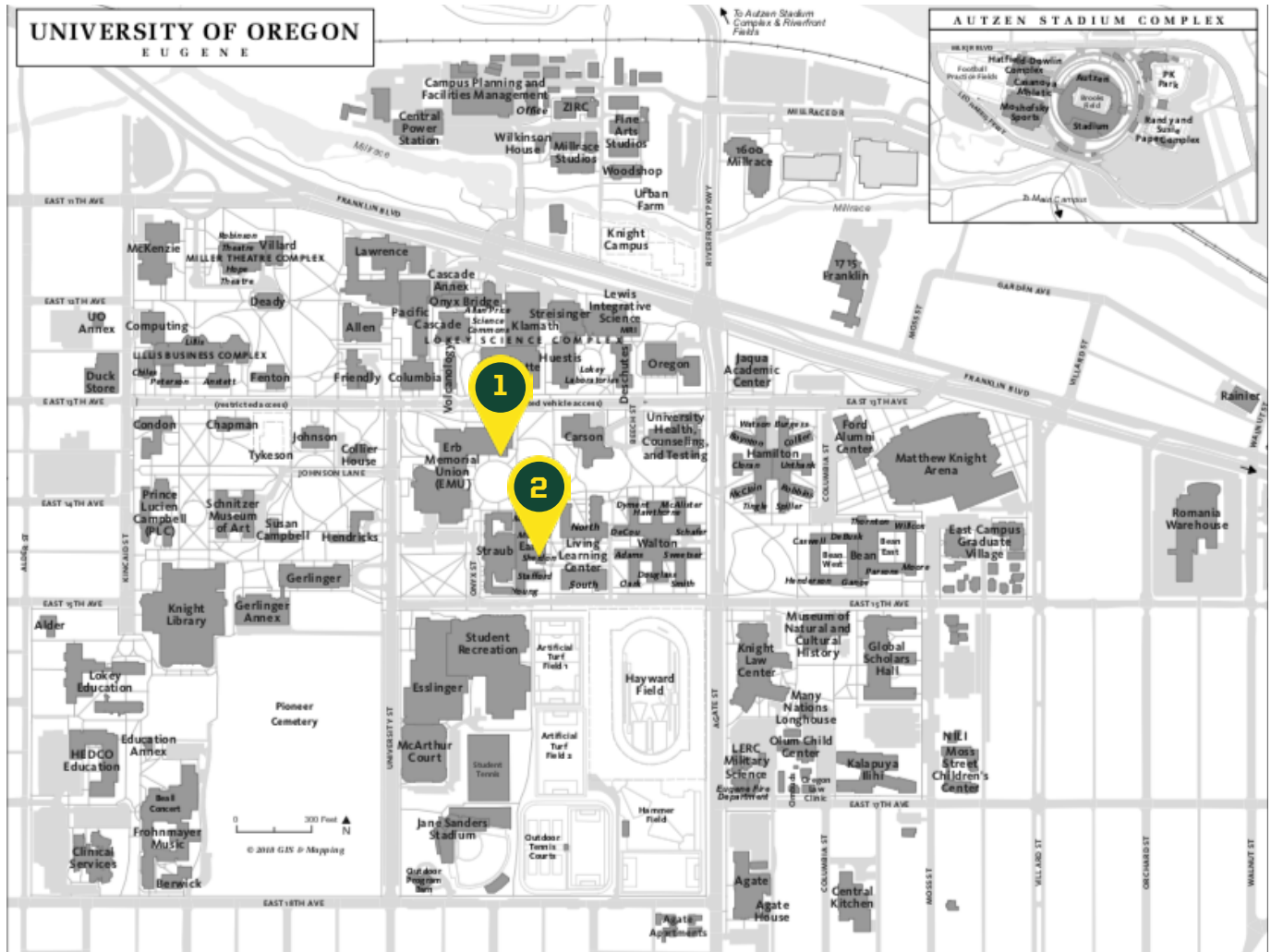

Additional Details & Important Information

Packing & Preparation

Eugene, Oregon in July is typically quite hot. Temperatures generally range from 27 – 32 degrees Celsius. Most inside activities will take place in rooms with air conditioning however we advise you pack for warm weather and bring items you need to be comfortable when outside (sunscreen, hats, sunglasses, etc.)

Suggested items to include in packing:

- Clothes for 12 days of program
- One formal outfit for our final day of presentations (business casual)
- Sun hat
- Sunscreen
- Sunglasses
- Sandals
- Shoes you can hike in
- Towel
- Active clothes
- Toiletries
- Any necessary medications/prescriptions

There are laundry facilities located in your accommodations. You'll have to purchase a laundry card to 'load' money onto. It is \$1.25 per load and free to dry. Additional information can be provided about utilizing laundry services if need be.

Arrival and Check In

All participants are expected to arrive on June 30th. There will be organized shuttles from the Eugene Airport – University of Oregon Campus and one shuttle from Portland International Airport to University of Oregon Campus.

Money & Currency:

This program includes room and board from June 30th-July 12th which means there will be breakfast, lunch and dinner available each day of the program EXCEPT on the day of the excursion, July 6th, when participants will be responsible for their own lunch. We suggest participants budget approximately \$100 of personal spending money, especially if you intend to buy gifts or souvenirs. A typical dinner at a restaurant in Eugene may cost \$15 - \$25.

Debit/credit cards are widely accepted in businesses in the U.S. If you plan to use a card while here make sure you notify your bank or check their foreign transaction fee. You can also change money when you arrive in the first major airport in the U.S.

You may also be able to change money in some banks.

Cellphones:

While staying on the University of Oregon campus, you will have consistent Wi-Fi access so it is unlikely you will need to buy a SIM card, data or cellphone for your time here. If it is a concern, data packages and SIM cards may be available in **major airports** (such as Seattle, Los Angeles, San Francisco) upon arrival.
